#### Talk about moving up a ladder.

Jason Frank started in the martial arts at the age of four at Red Dragon Karate under Shihan Louis D. Casamassa and became a junior instructor at age 12.

By the time he was 18, he was a second-degree black belt, and he eventually bought the same school in which he started his training.

From there, it was television and stardom on "The Power Rangers," and today he's the owner/CEO of Jesus Didn't Tap, a new MMA clothing line that is turning heads and flying off the racks like it is going out of style.

In the following story, Frank explains how the clothing line all came about. -KW

#### FROM RAGS COME RICHES

We just wanted to come up with an edgy, good, positive clothing line. Nothing that's negative. Something that is positive in the sport.

Once the name got out there, orders started coming in. You don't even understand the orders. We get e-mails about how this stuff has changed people's lives. How they rediscovered their faith.

Some of the e-mails I get are incredible. My customers are awesome, and they really care about my brand. It's just kind of a new industry in itself, and I wasn't prepared for that.

It's been good, a little overwhelming to be honest. I'm happy and blessed at the same time.

#### **BEHIND THE BRAND**

I try to keep everything neutral. I don't want to push religion down anyone's throat. At the same time, with Jesus Didn't Tap, you can take that meaning any way you want it as long as it gets the name out.

I get this question a lot: "Oh, you're using Jesus as a business thing."

The bottom line is there was a guy named Jesus Christ, and he obviously went through all the hings he went through.

The whole concept of the line was me and a friend sitting around saying, "Jesus didn't quit," and boom, Jesus Didn't Tap came up. To tap means he would quit, so he didn't tap.

There are different interpretations of the T-shirts. It's kind of crazy. Overall, there's a lot of controversy because we are the first Christian-based MMA clothing line, and we happen to have one of the strongest messages.

#### WHAT'S NEXT?

I want to open Jesus Didn't Tap Jiu-Jitsu schools. I would like to open 10 or so in lower-income cities. I want to have programs for kids and keep them off the streets.

I've been involved with martial arts since I was four. I'm a sixth-degree black belt. If it weren't for karate, I don't know where I'd be today, [so I want to give back].

Besides this, I have a couple more things in mind ... like women's shirts for breast cancer. People run ideas by me constantly.

So this is a clothing line to help people out, not just to help me out. It's helped me through all that I've been through in the past year and a half. Whether things are going good or things are going bad it's just what you gotta do.

I'm a warrior and a trooper, and I work through it. There are a lot of things I want to do with it. It's just a matter of time.
